1 MR. LANG: The Special House Committee on
2 Redistricting shall come to order. I am State
3 Representative Lou Lang from Skokie, Staff Majority
4 Leader of the House of Representatives and a member of
5 the Redistricting Committee, and I will be chairing
6 today's hearing.

7 I would like to recognize the following
8 members of the committee and others who are present
9 with us up here today: At my far left, Senator A. J.
10 Wilhelmi; next to him, Jack McGuire; and to my right,
11 Representative Renee Kosel. We may be joined by
12 others as we go through the process. I would like to
13 welcome everyone and thank you for coming today.

14 At the end of 2010 the United States Census
15 Bureau, as it does every decade, released its 2010
16 population totals for Illinois. The United States and
17 Illinois constitutions require that in the year
18 following the census the Illinois General Assembly
19 must redraw the boundary lines of the congressional,
20 legislative, and representative districts to account
21 for populationships over the last ten years. These
22 hearings are part of that process.

23 The Redistricting, Transparency, and Public
24 Participation Act requires us to hold at least four

1 meetings throughout the state. Our intention is to
2 hold far more than that minimum number. Our goal is
3 to hear from as many people as possible and to insure
4 this process is open to all residents of our state.
5 We are holding hearings throughout the state. Fifteen
6 are currently scheduled to gain as much information as
7 possible as we undertake this important task.

8 We are guided in this endeavor by the United
9 States Constitution which requires that we respect the
10 one person, one vote principle and draw districts of
11 substantially equal population.

12 We also are comprised with the Federal
13 Voting Rights Act which requires us to provide
14 minorities an equal opportunity to participate in the
15 electoral process and elect candidates of their
16 choice.

17 At the state level the Illinois Constitution
18 requires that the district be substantially equal in
19 population, compact, and contiguous.

20 Finally, the Illinois Voting Rights act
21 further requires us to allow minorities a voice in the
22 electoral process after compliance with the federal
23 and constitutional requirements that I have just
24 described.

1 In addition to these legal requirements
2 there are countless other factors that play a role in
3 the redistricting process, and we want to hear from
4 you in considering all of them without limitation.

5 We are interested in any relevant
6 demographic information such as social, political,
7 economic, religious, or any other characteristics that
8 are unique to your community or to your organizations.
9 We are interested in maps of your community or
10 organizations as encompassed by relevant precincts or
11 voter tabulation districts or however you want to
12 present them to us.

13 We want to hear your specific views on any
14 social, political, economic, or religious interests
15 commonly held in the community, any specific interest
16 group that exists, any concerns you have regarding
17 current redistricting boundaries and suggestions for
18 the drawing of new boundaries. In short, we want to
19 hear any testimony that is relevant to the drawing of
20 our new congressional, legislative, or representative
21 districts.

22 If you have a proposed map, we will take it
23 and consider it. If you want to draw your own map but
24 lack the capacity to do so, we have created two public

1 viewing stations where senses and mapmaking resources
2 will be made available to you. One is located in
3 Springfield, in Room 401 of the Stratton Office
4 Building, open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to
5 4:30 p.m. The second work station, a joint effort
6 with the Senate Redistricting Committee, is located on
7 the 7th floor of the Bilandic Building, located at 160
8 North LaSalle Street, Chicago. You can schedule an
9 appointment to access either public station by calling
10 area code (217) 558-3036, that is (217) 558-3036.

11 You may also submit any comments,
12 information, or proposed maps to us in person at those
13 viewing stations.

14 Finally, you may submit any information or
15 comments to us by e-mail at ilredistricting@gmail.com,
16 that is ilredistricting@gmail.com.

17 We'll transcribe the testimony at all of the
18 hearings and post that testimony to our website
19 www.ilhousedems.com/redistricting, that is
20 www.ilhousedems.com/redistricting.

21 Any documentary evidence that we have
22 receive, be it written testimony or other data or
23 proposed maps, will also be uploaded to our website.

24 Our only caveat is that due to security

1 reasons we will not accept maps on a disc or flash
2 drive. We will ask for a hardcopy of that map.

3 As for today, we will begin with a short
4 slideshow presentation. Following that brief
5 presentation, we have a number of witnesses who have
6 indicated in advance a desire to testify, and we will
7 hear from them first.

8 Given the number of interested parties, we
9 will ask that witnesses limit their testimony to four
10 minutes. We will bring witnesses forward in group
11 panels or we may just bring them up one at a time and
12 give them the podium.

13 If you have written testimony prepared, we
14 would ask that you submit that testimony to us and
15 just briefly summarize it in your oral presentation
16 rather than reading it to us.

17 After the scheduled witnesses, anyone else
18 wishing to speak may do so. Every witness, whether
19 prescheduled or not, needs to fill out a witness slip,
20 which looks like this, which they have outside,
21 stating your intention to provide testimony for the
22 record. If you have not done so, please return to the
23 sign-in table where you first came in and make our
24 staff aware of your wish to testify. Our intention is

1 to allow everyone an opportunity to participate.

2 Representative Kosel, would you like to make
3 a statement?

4 REPRESENTATIVE KOSEL: Yes, now that I know
5 how to turn on the mic.

6 Thank you very much. State Representative
7 Renee Kosel, Assistant Minority Leader on the
8 republican side.

9 I would like to applaud the committee for
10 putting together these informational meetings. It is
11 very, very important that we gather information from
12 across the state and have that to put into the
13 mapmaking process. However, if that information is
14 put into the mapmaking process and the map is not
15 released to the public for input before it is voted on
16 either by this committee or by the general assembly,
17 that input is meaningless. So I would urge the
18 committee to please make sure that we see a map before
19 it is voted on and that the public have an opportunity
20 to react to that map to see if their special interests
21 are being addressed in that map.

22 I look forward to hearing your comments.
23 Thank you very much.

24 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you,

1 Representative. Senator Wilhelmi?

2 SENATOR WILHELMI: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
3 Good afternoon to everyone here. Thank you to
4 Representative Lou Lang, Representative Kosel,
5 Representative McGuire for conducting this special
6 meeting today.

7 I want to echo what Representative Lang
8 said. We want to make sure that we have full
9 participation. We want to hear from everyone here in
10 the Joliet, Will County area. It is really important
11 that we gather the information, as Renee said, as
12 Representative Kosel said, gather the information and
13 make sure this map is fair and balanced and will allow
14 for not only full representation but effective
15 representation for the people that live in Will
16 County.

17 I want to just add one more thing. The
18 Senate is conducting nine hearings across the state.
19 Chairman Lange said that there will be fifteen house
20 hearings. Together that will be somewhere in the
21 neighborhood of twenty-four hearings that we will be
22 having across the state of Illinois. It is our intent
23 to gather that information and make sure that that
24 information is used as we create this map.

1 And then, lastly, Representative Kosel
2 mentioned that it would be important to have hearings
3 after the map is introduced, and it is the intention
4 of the Senate, and I am sure the House as well, but we
5 are going to strive to have two hearings after the
6 introduced map is released.

7 Senator Kwame Raoul, who is my seat mate, he
8 will be conducting those meetings after that map is
9 introduced. Again, it's a pleasure to be here. I
10 appreciate Representative Lange conducting this
11 meeting, and I look forward to learning quite a bit
12 this evening.

13 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you, Senator.
14 Representative McGuire.

15 REPRESENTATIVE MCGUIRE: Thank you
16 Mr. Lange. I am Jack McGuire, the state
17 representative from the Joliet area, in case you don't
18 know me. And I would like you to know me.

19 I have kind of a cold, so I am not going to
20 be speaking very much. We have gone through this
21 before, and I think it was ten years ago when I first
22 went to Springfield. We flew all over the state, and
23 it seemed like some of the places we went to had
24 airports. And when it came to Joliet they said there

1 is no airport big enough for us to land, and I think
2 we had to go to Lewis College or something else.

3 But anyhow, this redistricting situation
4 comes up every ten years, and it is an important event
5 or important practice as Lou said, and I intend to be
6 fully informed and try to get the district to the
7 liking of the people who live in the district. So,
8 thank you very much for showing up.

9 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you,
10 Representative.

11 Before we proceed with the slideshow
12 presentation, again, anyone who wishes to testify must
13 fill out a witness slip. So, if you do intend to
14 testify, please go back to the sign-in table and sign
15 a slip for us.

16 With that, let's proceed with the slideshow
17 presentation. I hope you can all see the screen over
18 here. If not, anyone that wants to can feel free to
19 move to that side of the room so they can see the
20 screen. Please proceed.

21 DAN FREY: Hello. My name is Dan Frey, and
22 I work for the Illinois House of Representatives. I'm
23 here to give a brief overview of our state's
24 redistricting procedure.

1 I'll briefly discuss the procedures and
2 background of redistricting and information on The
3 Voting Rights Act. I will also be going over the new
4 state redistricting guidelines recently signed into
5 law. Finally, we will look at the results of the 2010
6 Census, and what those results say about your
7 community.

8 Redistricting is the process that ensures
9 all Illinois residents are afforded equal
10 representation in the state legislature and federal
11 congress as guaranteed by the United States
12 Constitution. The US Supreme Court held in a series
13 of rulings in the 1960s that congressional and state
14 legislative districts in each state must be of equal
15 populations, establishing the principle of one person,
16 one vote. As a result, states redraw congressional
17 and state districts every ten years to reflect changes
18 in population as shown by the census.

19 The timeline for redrawing the legislative
20 map is based on the Illinois Constitution.

21 On December 21, data collected by the 2010
22 census was delivered to the President. The full
23 block-by-block census profile of Illinois which will
24 be used in the redistricting process was released in

1 February.

2 The Illinois State legislature has the
3 initial responsibility of passing the new
4 congressional and state maps. Both the State House
5 and State Senate must pass a plan with majority votes.
6 The plan must then be signed by the governor. If a
7 new map does not go into effect by the constitutional
8 deadline of June 30, responsibility for creating a new
9 map passes from the Legislature and governor to a
10 Legislative Redistricting Commission.

11 The commission shall consist of eight
12 members, with no more than four from the same
13 political party. A majority vote of five or more
14 commission members will constitute final approval of a
15 new map. However, if the commission does not agree to
16 a map by September 1, the Illinois Supreme Court will
17 submit two names, one from each party, to the Illinois
18 Secretary of State, who will choose one name at random
19 to serve as the ninth member of the commission. Five
20 of the nine members of the commission must agree to a
21 plan no later than October 5.

22 In order to understand how the census data
23 is used to draw new districts, we must note several
24 legal guiding principles. First among these

1 principles is equal population. State law mirrors the
2 federal one person, one vote standard and mandates
3 congressional and state districts to contain
4 substantially equal population. As a result of the
5 2010 census, the target population of each House
6 District is 108,734 residents, while the ideal
7 population for a Senate District is 217,468.

8 Federal and state law also require all
9 districts to be contiguous, which means that all parts
10 of the district must be next to each other unless
11 connected by water. Annexations and unincorporated
12 areas in municipalities and counties sometimes mean
13 communities are dis-contiguous. However,
14 congressional and state districts must be adjacent or
15 connected at all points.

16 A more difficult requirement to define is
17 compactness. There are at least 30 different
18 scientific ways to measure how compact a district is,
19 but no statute or court precedent identifies standard
20 criteria of compactness. In theory, compactness
21 focuses on the shape of the district's boundaries, how
22 spread out a district is from a central core, or where
23 the district's population center of gravity is. In
24 practice, compactness is hindered by geography and

1 on-the-ground realities. So, often the interpretation
2 of compactness involves more than a visual test.

3 Illinois is one of fourteen states that
4 nests two of its house districts, also called
5 representative districts, inside one of its senate
6 districts, also called legislative districts.

7 Mapmakers will also look, where possible, to
8 follow existing political and geographic boundaries in
9 ways that maximize a community's opportunity to have
10 its interests represented. As we know, however,
11 county, municipality, township, and natural geographic
12 boundaries are not always compact and contiguous. By
13 studying census data and holding public hearings like
14 this to listen to the thoughts of residents across the
15 state, lawmakers look to identify what are known as
16 communities of interest. A community of interest is a
17 group of people concentrated in a geographic area who
18 are socially, culturally, ethnically, economically,
19 religiously, or otherwise alike, and can be joined in
20 a district to most effectively have their voices
21 heard. The factors contributing to any particular
22 community of interest will vary throughout the state.

23 Federal law requires the districting plans
24 to represent the minority representation. The

1 principles of the Federal Voting Rights Act are in
2 place to present the reduction of opportunities for
3 minority populations to participate equally in the
4 electoral process. However, districts cannot be drawn
5 solely on the basis of race.

6 Earlier this year, Governor Quinn signed
7 legislation to protect the representation of racial
8 and language minority groups. Senate Bill 3976 helps
9 to prevent minority fracturing, or dividing a
10 concentration of minorities among two or more
11 districts, by requiring mapmakers to consider creating
12 crossover districts, or influence districts.

13 What are crossover districts, coalition
14 districts and influence districts?

15 A crossover district is one in which a large
16 minority group may elect the candidate of its choice
17 with help from voters of the majority group.

18 A coalition district brings multiple racial
19 or language minority groups together to elect a
20 candidate of their choice.

21 An influence district allows a group to
22 influence an election outcome without being the
23 majority population in a district.

24 These new state law requirements come into

1 play only after compliance with federal law and US and
2 state constitutional requirements on redistricting.

3 In addition, the law ensures transparency by
4 requiring public hearings across the state, one of
5 which we are having here right now. The hearing will
6 provide space for the residents to share their
7 thoughts on the redistricting process, a key component
8 to creating a map that best represents the people of
9 Illinois. At the end of the presentation, we will
10 display an e-mail address on the screen where you can
11 submit your ideas for consideration. The committee is
12 also accepting written testimony or documentation
13 today.

14 So now that we have covered the
15 redistricting process, let's take a look at the census
16 data that will be used to draw new districts.

17 All of the maps you are going to see are
18 drawn by using Census Blocks, which is the smallest
19 level of geography the Census Bureau uses to report
20 population data.

21 As of the 2010 census, the total population
22 of the state of Illinois is 12,830,632, as compared to
23 the state's 2000 total population of 12,419,293, an
24 increase of about 410,000. The counties with the

1 largest population by percentage increase since 2000
2 are Boone, Grundy, Kane, Kendall, and Will counties.

3 Demographically speaking, Illinois has seen
4 lots of change over the last decade. The white
5 population has risen statewide by 0.6 percent to
6 8,167,753.

7 Illinois' Africa-American population has
8 fallen statewide by .6 percent to 1,832,924.

9 Illinois' Hispanic population, though, has
10 risen statewide by 32.5 percent to a total of
11 2,027,578.

12 Illinois' Asian population has also risen
13 statewide by 38.6 percent to 580,586.

14 Now we will look at the Joliet area, which
15 consists of Joliet, Crest Hill, Plainfield, Crystal
16 Lawns, and Shorewood.

17 In 2000, the area's population was 155,109.
18 In the last ten years the area's population has
19 increased to 225,338.

20 Here is a map of the area's African-American
21 population. The total African-American population of
22 the area in 2010 is 30,506.

23 The Hispanic population, seen here in 2010,
24 is 50,905. The Hispanic minority group is the largest

1 minority in this area.

2 The Asian population, shown on our final map
3 here, was counted at 6,514 for the 2010 census.

4 Combined, the minority population of these
5 cities is 87,925, nearly 40 percent of the area's
6 total population.

7 Thank you very much for attending today's
8 hearing and sharing your thoughts and opinions with

13 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you very much.

14 We have been joined by Franco Coladipietro.
15 Thank you for being here.

16 And we are ready to proceed. Again, if you
17 wish to testify, please fill out a witness slip. When
18 you do testify, make sure you state your name clearly
19 for the record and spell your last name for the court
20 reporter, and also let us know the name of the group
21 you represent if you represent one.

22 The first witness I have on the list is
23 Warren Doris from Joliet. Is Warren here? I don't
24 have a witness slip.

1 All right. Then we will proceed to Thomas
2 Thanas, City Manager of Joliet.

3 THOMAS THANAS: Good afternoon,
4 Representative Lang. Thomas A. Thanas, T-h-a-n-a-s.
5 Representative Lang, Representative Kosel,
6 Representative Coladipietro, Representative McGuire,
7 and Senator Wilhelmi, welcome to Joliet. On behalf of
8 outgoing Mayor Schultz and incoming Mayor-Elect Tom
9 Girrani, we welcome you.

10 Representative Lange, that was a hotly
11 contested seat a couple weeks ago, so I hope you are
12 comfortable in it.

13 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: It is very nice.

14 THOMAS THANAS: We didn't have your name on
15 the ballot so we didn't have a chance to vote for you,
16 but welcome to Joliet. We are thrilled that you are
17 here.

18 Joliet has been well represented for many
19 years. Certainly Representative McGuire, Senator
20 Wilhelmi, and I think his predecessor is in the
21 audience also, Senator Walsh, now County Executive
22 Walsh, has done a great job of helping all of us here.

23 Joliet, as you know and as you just saw, has
24 doubled his population in the last 20 years. It

1 increased by 38 percent over the last ten years. We
2 are a diverse community deep in our ethnic roots. We
3 really celebrate our diversity and ethnicity and now
4 we are fortunate to have great representation in this
5 area. We have Representative Kosel on the east,
6 Representative McAsey case on the north, and of course
7 Majority Leader Cross on the west. So we really have
8 been very fortunate in having great voices in
9 Springfield on behalf of our community.

10 We also have some great neighbors, and we
11 don't mind sharing our representatives and Senators
12 with those neighbors, Shorewood, Crest Hill, New
13 Lenox, Plainfield, a lot of great towns. Shorewood I
14 believe is represented by Mayor Chapman here today, a
15 few rows back. We have really enjoyed great
16 relationships and having our voice in Springfield
17 through you.

18 We encourage you to identify Joliet as a
19 standalone community. We are really not a suburb of
20 Chicago. We have been here for many years. We have
21 grown up on our own, and we like our identity. And we
22 really appreciate you taking into consideration that
23 identity as a single entity.

24 So, when the map is being drawn, we are

1 hoping to keep our town together. Even though we have
2 grown and we are very different than what we were
3 20 years ago, but as the fourth largest city in the
4 state of Illinois, we would like to continue having a
5 representative that is based in Joliet. I know we
6 can't control where they come from, but we really like
7 the idea of having Joliet recognized as a standalone
8 community and taking into account the rich ethnic
9 population that we have.

10 We thank you again, and we appreciate the
11 opportunity to be heard on the matter.

12 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you. And while
13 you are here, we want to thank the City of Joliet for
14 your hospitality and allowing us to have our meeting
15 here today.

16 THOMAS THANAS: Thank you.

17 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: The next witness is
18 Larry Walsh, Will County Executive.

19 LARRY WALSH: Thank you very much for the
20 opportunity to speak before the Committee. Welcome to
21 Will County. All of the representatives and our
22 senator, A. J. Wilhelmi, we appreciate you taking time
23 out of your busy schedules to conduct these public
24 hearings to hear what is important to local

1 constituency.

2 As you saw on your own slide projection
3 PowerPoint, Will County was recognized as the fastest
4 growing county in the state of Illinois, again, this
5 last ten years. We increased population by
6 approximately 178,000 residents. We are asking that,
7 with the diversity and the population growth that we
8 have seen, the utmost consideration be given by the
9 committee.

10 When laying out the legislative districts
11 that we respond to the importance of trying to, as Tom
12 Thanas, City Administrator, said, the importance of
13 our communities, trying to stay whole as much as
14 possible, we don't want to see legislative districts
15 come through the middle of some of our communities.
16 We want to see, as you saw on your presentation, a
17 huge increase in our Latino population here in Will
18 County and our African-American population and Asian
19 population also here in Will County.

20 I know it's difficult. We can't take care
21 of all of them and create a special, special district,
22 legislative district for all of them. The districts
23 are going to be at the number of approximately one
24 hundred and twenty-some thousand approximately for

1 legislative district. And so we understand that, but
2 we want to see that the utmost consideration be given.

3 Another issue is if we could look at the
4 importance of the precincts, the 450-some precincts
5 that we already have here in Will County, that if we
6 can follow those boundary lines as we create
7 legislative districts, which means that then our
8 county clerk, Nancy Schultz Voots, does not have to
9 reconstruct precincts to coincide with the legislative
10 districts that are created.

11 Let's do it in reverse. You follow what
12 districts we have precincts that we have already set
13 up, if you can, which just makes our job a little bit
14 easier.

15 I know Nancy is very, very adamant in
16 wanting to merge precincts together to try and cut
17 down on the cost -- the cost of elections are getting
18 to an extraordinary high -- and that to try and make
19 sure that we are planning on merging some of our
20 precincts to make sure that we maximize the effort
21 that we are going to put forward to make sure the
22 voters that are in there have the opportunity to vote.
23 But we are not having precincts that only consist of
24 300 or 400 voters.

1 So we appreciate the opportunity to be here
2 before you. I know you have a very, very difficult
3 job when you are trying to redistrict the whole state
4 of Illinois. Will County, a large area, when, as Tom
5 Thanas said, we are very, very happy with the
6 legislators that have done a very good job of
7 representing us here in Will County over the years,
8 that we continue to be looked at as the growing point
9 here in the northeastern part of Illinois, that those
10 issues are addressed.

11 Thank you for the opportunity to speak
12 before you, and thank you very much for coming to Will
13 County to hold one of these hearings.

14 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you, Mr. Walsh.

15 Next witness is Sherri Hale, from the Black
16 Bar Association of Will County.

17 SHERRI HALE: I am Sherri Hale. I am the
18 president of the Black Bar Association of Will County.
19 We are a new group that has emerged since the last
20 census was taken. Founded in December 2007, we are
21 comprised of a diverse group of attorneys who practice
22 law throughout the Will County community as well as
23 neighboring towns.

24 Throughout our membership we endeavor to

1 provide access to the legal process and to seek
2 justice for fellow community members through education
3 as well as advocacy initiative.

4 It is through these efforts and outreach
5 that we have come familiar with some of the community
6 interest that not only affects Will County but other
7 surrounding counties. So we hope that today you take
8 into consideration during the redistricting process
9 our idea that the boundary lines should reflect common
10 communities with common interests.

11 We, the BBA members, are pleased to
12 participate in the public hearing to provide feedback
13 as you begin the daunting task of trying to redraw the
14 line throughout the state of Illinois.

15 We ask also, some of the sentiments have
16 already been shared here, but from the perspective of
17 someone who has moved into the community since the
18 last census, and what we are finding with a lot of
19 communities that we are serving is that some things
20 that are common, there are common concerns about
21 transportation, there are common concerns about
22 knowing your neighbor, especially to those of us who
23 have transplanted from other states and other areas.
24 We found Will County as well as parts of Grundy

1 County, Kane County, and Kendall County our members
2 come from those areas, but we have found you rely on
3 your neighbors a little bit more when you don't have
4 your family close. So, when you take that into
5 consideration, we hope that you try to identify some
6 of those common interests as you draw those lines.

7 So maybe it makes sense for Will County to
8 be in one congressional district and maybe have that
9 congressional district include Will County, Kendall,
10 and Kane as opposed to going downstate. We find that
11 if there are more common interests, although we are
12 not technically a suburb of Chicago, but a lot of
13 people work and commute to Chicago. So, if you have
14 those common interests within that district, you will
15 find that that community of interest will be better
16 represented in the general assembly through that one
17 representative. So we ask you to take that into
18 consideration.

19 Additionally, we know that Will County is a
20 very fast growing community. We know that that will
21 be taken into consideration as well.

22 But we also know that some of the demands in
23 our community are outpacing the resources, such as
24 friends of my children live in Plainfield School

1 District. We were out growing the number of schools
2 and facilities that were available. So, although we
3 want to say that is not a concern of this area that
4 the resource also be there, we want a representative
5 that is available, a representative that has contact
6 with that community, a representative that, when we
7 pick up the phone and explain those concerns, that
8 there will be some responsiveness. So that is why we
9 support the idea of a compact congressional district.
10 If you are compact in the community, we feel like our
11 voice will actually be heard and all the minorities of
12 communities' voices will be heard.

13 The BBA supports a map that captures common
14 community, common interest, and we look forward to the
15 actual draft maps being released so that we can
16 provide specific feedback that can be taken into
17 consideration before the final maps are voted on by
18 the general assembly. Thank you.

19 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you very much.

20 If you are reading from a prepared text, if
21 you would leave a copy of that for staff, we would
22 appreciate it. Thank you.

23 The next witness is Michael Carruthers, from
24 the Joliet Black Chamber of Commerce. You are not

1 going to testify, sir?

2 MICHAEL CARRUTHERS: No, sir, not at the
3 present time. We will be attentively listening and,
4 as we go along through the process, we will be coming
5 forward.

6 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you, sir.

7 The next witness is Dennis Grosskopf, Will
8 County Democratic Party.

9 DENNIS GROSSKOPF: I'm Dennis. The last
10 name is Grosskopf, G-r-o-s-s-k-o-p-f. I appreciate
11 the time, the chairmen, and the members.

12 I echo Chief Executive Walsh, to focus on
13 the precinct. And this might be -- well, the one
14 experience I had was with the growth in Will County,
15 that schools have to go for referendums to get more
16 buildings. I was in a split precinct for the school
17 in which I was the thirtieth voter, and I also teach
18 government, so I am kind of in tune to politics, and I
19 know what school district I was in.

20 When they gave me the ballot, it had the
21 Troy pool, not the one with the grade school. Troy
22 was going for a referendum, and because of a split
23 precinct, I don't think the workers knew that there
24 were 2000 ballots for that one precinct, so they gave

1 me Troy. I said I am not Troy. I am Minooka Grade
2 School District. They then finally found the package
3 and opened that up. And then Troy, I believe that was
4 the time where they lost the referendum by like a
5 single ballot or two. But I was the thirtieth person,
6 so I didn't know how many people voted before me.
7 Most people don't know exactly what the school
8 districts may be that they are in, especially if they
9 are older and they don't have kids and then they just
10 move in, but you hear about it in the newspaper. So
11 that can cause a problem when the precincts are split.

12 So I encourage the General Assembly to focus
13 on the precincts and don't split them because it can
14 cause problems down the road. So, thank you for your
15 time.

16 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you very much.

17 The next witness is Mark Schneidewind, Will
18 County Farm Bureau. I hope I pronounced your name
19 correctly.

20 MARK SCHNEIDEWIND: I am Mark Schneidewind,
21 S-c-h-n-e-i-d-e-w-i-n-d, representing Will County Farm
22 Bureau local farmers. I also would like to thank
23 everybody for the opportunity to be able to provide
24 testimony on the redistricting maps for the state of

1 Illinois.

2 Representing agricultural districts,
3 agricultural is a very important industry here in the
4 state of Illinois. It is our state's largest
5 industry, and it employs one out of eight jobs in our
6 state. Ninety-four percent of the farms in Illinois
7 are family owned, which is a very important process
8 for us.

9 Illinois has one of the top states that is
10 depend in regards to our basically our exports coming
11 out of our state, and it is also dependent on
12 agricultural as number one in the nation.

13 Illinois is consistently number one or two
14 producer of corn and soybeans in the nation, as well
15 as number four producer of hogs throughout the nation
16 as well. We only represent 4 percent of the farm
17 ground throughout the nation, but we still produce
18 17 percent of our corn and 17 percent of our soybeans
19 in the state throughout the nation right here in
20 Illinois. Not only that, we are a very big producer
21 of -- number one producer of horseradish and pumpkins
22 throughout the state of Illinois. So it's a very
23 important asset Illinois agricultural is.

24 We also have 77 wineries throughout the

1 State of Illinois. So, it's a very important part of
2 our process with our representatives. Illinois is
3 also the leading state in related industries in
4 agricultural, such as soybean processing, as well as
5 machinery manufacturing, as well as foreign exports,
6 as I mentioned before.

7 The new maps should be drawn to include
8 agricultural districts that represent the majority of
9 farmers in that area that will allow rural residents
10 to have a say and influence our constitution for
11 future elections.

12 Illinois farmers want to have a chance to
13 elect their legislators who understand agricultural
14 and also are part of the rural process as well.

15 The new districts should follow county lines
16 whenever possible to keep counties from being split
17 into multiple legislative districts, as we have heard
18 from several other people as well this evening.

19 We do appreciate the opportunity to hear
20 that once this map is drawn there will be several
21 other hearings in the state, and we do appreciate the
22 opportunity today to be able to provide this
23 testimony.

24 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you very much,

1 and if you would provide a copy of that statement to
2 staff, we would appreciate that very much.

3 Is there a representative here from the
4 Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights?

5 Someone from Draw the Line Illinois?

6 Dean Clough, AARP?

7 DEAN CLOUGH: I am just here as an observer,
8 Representative Lange.

9 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you very much.

10 And do we have a representative from SEIU?

11 John Grueling, Will County Center for
12 Economic Development?

13 Dave Neal, Joliet Arsenal Development
14 Authority?

15 Ken Miller, City of Naperville?

16 KEN MILLER: Good afternoon. I am Ken
17 Miller, Councilman for the City of Naperville.

18 You may wonder why Naperville is here and
19 interested in this hearing. I don't believe there was
20 one in DuPage County, which is most of the city of
21 Naperville, but also personally I live in Wheatland
22 Township in Will County, so this redistricting issue
23 is important to me as well as far as Will County is
24 Joliet area.

1 Naperville is the fifth largest city in the
2 state of Illinois, with approximately 142,000 people.
3 Will County, a portion of that, represents about
4 25,000 people.

5 Naperville is primarily represented by
6 Senator Johnson and Representative Senger on the west
7 side of Naperville, and Senator Dillard and Connelly
8 on the east side of Naperville, but we also have
9 representation in pieces from Representative Fortner,
10 McAsey, and Representative Cross, who is my
11 representative.

12 But the majority, clearly the majority with
13 the two representatives and two senators represent
14 most of the city. It is primarily also arranged by
15 the township lines, which makes it very convenient and
16 consistent, as the previous speaker spoke about
17 splitting precincts.

18 So we have done very well with the majority
19 of those two representatives, but we believe that the
20 population with unincorporated Naperville -- we think
21 it's about 170,000 people -- if you look at part of
22 Representative Connelly's district, which includes
23 Lisle and unincorporated parts of Lisle, there are
24 over 200, and we think closer to 220,000 people.

1 So one of the considerations would be to
2 have one senator a district and two representatives
3 covering Naperville and Lisle or portions thereof to
4 come up with the number 217,000 that you need.

5 So we believe that we would like to continue
6 to keep it consistent within Naperville versus
7 fragmented any further than it already is with the
8 fine representation and stick with the two
9 representatives and one senate seat, if that is
10 possible.

11 So I thank you for hearing me, and I
12 appreciate your very difficult task that you have
13 before you. Thank you.

14 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you very much.

15 I neglected earlier to announce that
16 Representative Senger has joined us. So thank you,
17 Representative.

18 The next witness will be Keith Pekau. And
19 if I mispronounced your name, please excuse me.

20 MR. PEKAU: Thank you very much. Keith
21 Pekau, P-e-k-a-u. I am 45 years old. I was born and
22 raised in Orland Park. I am here today, like many
23 others. Joliet is the closest one to Orland Park, so
24 that is why I am here today, even though we are not in

1 Will County.

2 I own a business that is in Orland Park as
3 well as in new Lenox, so I do have an interest across
4 Will County and Cook County.

5 First and foremost, the most important thing
6 about this process is it needs to be transparent. The
7 only way for the public to know what is going on is
8 for your maps to be brought out to us at least two
9 weeks in advance before you vote on it so that we can
10 comment on it. If we don't get a chance to comment on
11 it, all these hearings are wasted.

12 Orland Park has a rich history. When I was
13 born there, it was a town of about 6,000 people. So,
14 as I've grown, Orland Park has grown significantly.
15 Currently it has about 60,000 people. When I was
16 first born there it was primarily a farming community.
17 Currently it's a sprawling suburb, much like
18 Naperville but only smaller, we have numerous parks
19 throughout the village. We are a tree city. We
20 preserve a lot of open land. Orland Park deserves to
21 have representation for the community as a whole.

22 Currently Orland Park is represented by four
23 different state representative districts, 81, 37, 28
24 and 35, additionally, four senate districts. So all

1 four of those representative districts also break into
2 senators that split our community. In addition, two
3 US congressional districts cover Orland Park, so both
4 number 1 and number 13.

5 Just to give you some idea of how these
6 districts are set up, District 28, meanders from
7 Orland Square Mall in the heart of town all the way to
8 87th Street east of Western -- excuse me, 100th Street
9 and Cottage Grove in the city.

10 District 35 goes from Will-Cook Road on the
11 west side of Orland Park all the way to 87th Street
12 and Western, and it meanders in about a 35-mile wide
13 corridor. Senate Districts 14 and 18 are even worse.

14 Congressional District 1 takes half of
15 Orland Park and snakes its way all the way up the Dan
16 Ryan, with a little sliver that somehow we call
17 contiguous, through the Robert Taylor Public Housing
18 Projects and then all the way up to I55. That is
19 hardly representative of Orland Park. I don't think
20 any of these districts even remotely represent the
21 residents of Orland Park that are kind of stuck in.

22 Currently Orland Park is represented by one
23 high school district, one village government, one fire
24 protection district, one township. However, at the

1 state level, we have four house districts, four senate
2 districts and two congressional districts. I only
3 have to ask why, and this is a perfect opportunity to
4 fix that.

5 Currently, I don't believe it's designed to
6 give us fair representation. I believe it's designed
7 to break up our vote.

8 Orland Park residents deserve to have
9 elective leaders to represent their interests. No
10 rational person sitting in this room would think that
11 Orland Park resembles the Robert Taylor homes or
12 Cottage Grove on 95th Street. All of those areas
13 deserve to have representation that reflects them as
14 well.

15 It makes no sense to have needs of certain
16 groups carved out so that they have no voting power.
17 Orland Park should have -- Orland Township should be
18 one district. The average district will have about
19 110,000 people. Orland Township has 91.

20 Currently, there is no reasonable way to
21 justify having two congressional reps, four state reps
22 and four state senators. If you must divide the
23 region, divide it into two state representatives and
24 one senator encompassing both and one congressman.

1 Certainly there is no reason to have two congressmen.
2 The answer should also not be swallow more Orland Park
3 with inner city representation. Currently that is
4 what we have.

5 And no one would say that Orland Park looks
6 anything like the city of Chicago. It's much closer
7 in makeup to the neighboring towns that sit in Will
8 County of Homer Glen, Mokena, New Lenox, and also
9 Palos Park. Those are areas where you could have a
10 contiguous grouping of 110,000 people without any
11 difficulty whatsoever and have very common interest,
12 common communities with a representative that
13 represents our interests and not the interest of
14 someone that is two miles from Lake Michigan off of
15 Dan Ryan.

16 I hope that the redistricting process that
17 we are going through gives us a much more
18 geographically consistent map. I have heard the same
19 thing from Executive Walsh and from others who spoke
20 here before, that we want something that somewhat
21 mimics something that we already have, instead of
22 breaking our townships, our school districts and
23 everything else into smaller groups and carving them
24 out for the state doesn't make any sense. We should

1 be using a lot of the existing districts and building
2 them up to form the state's state rep and state
3 senator's position.

4 Thank you very much for giving me the time
5 to speak to you, and I hope that there is continued
6 transparency in the process so that we can have
7 hearings like this after the maps are drawn. Thank
8 you.

9 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you very much
10 for your testimony today.

11 The next witness today is Steve Orlando,
12 Illinois Latinos for Fair Representation.

13 While Mr. Orlando is coming up, if anyone is
14 going to testify who has not given us a witness slip,
15 please step outside and have one prepared.

16 STEVE ORLANDO: I am Steve Orlando,
17 representing the group called Illinois Latino's for
18 Fair Representation made up of folks from Chicago, the
19 suburbs, northern Illinois of all backgrounds, blue
20 collar and white collar, just with a couple points
21 that we would like to ask the committee.

22 Thank you for holding fifteen meetings
23 across the state. Of course, what is more important
24 is to have a version of the map that may be already in

1 the speaker's hands made public first and giving us
2 due time, two weeks minimum, even three weeks, to
3 review it, comment on it and make any suggestions
4 about some of the lines that are proposed.

5 I am a big fan of majority/minority
6 districts. I fear that the Illinois Voting Rights Act
7 that was recently passed focuses more on promoting
8 influence districts, having minority committees that
9 maybe make up 25 or 30 percent of the district, but I
10 don't feel we should shy away from districts that make
11 up 55 percent of Latino population, 55 percent of the
12 African-American population.

13 And to echo the previous presenter from
14 Orland Park, I can't agree more. I think it would
15 really benefit us as a community if our state
16 representative's district office is within a few miles
17 of our home as opposed to have having to drive 12 or
18 15 miles to our state representative's office.

19 So that is all we expect fully and, in fact,
20 demand is that opportunity to view the map before
21 either this committee or the general assembly holds
22 votes on the final portion of that map. Thank you for
23 your consideration.

24 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you very much

1 for your testimony. I will say unequivocally for the
2 record that no maps have been drafted as of this time.
3 So, I heard you say something about the speaker having
4 maps. There are no maps. I can tell you that.

5 The next witness is Janet Siloski,
6 Republican Precinct Committeeman.

7 MS. SILOSKI: My name is Janet Siloski,
8 S-i-l-o-s-k-i. I am a precinct committeeman from
9 Plainfield, here in Will County.

10 Now, as some may know or do not, I attended
11 the McHenry meeting on reapportioning and
12 redistricting this last weekend, and as I stated then
13 a public office is a public trust and we trust you to
14 do the right thing when it comes to redistricting so
15 that all districts will be fair and equitable, not
16 only contiguous, which they must be, but also compact
17 so they represent people appropriately and not done
18 along party lines.

19 And I know, having lived in this state
20 almost all of my life, that decade after decade after
21 decade, it has done to represent the interest of the
22 democratic party and not anyone else.

23 Now, some people may think differently. I
24 would like to think that when individuals or citizens

1 such as myself come here to a meeting like this, with
2 ideas that we would like you to consider, that this
3 will actually happen.

4 However, talking with a congressional aide
5 yesterday, he agreed with me that for the most part
6 these meetings -- with no disrespect to any of you
7 individuals here, but rather to party politics
8 unfortunately -- it ends up being more of a dog and
9 pony show than anything else.

10 We want you to represent the citizens of
11 Illinois, not one party, not the other. Do what needs
12 to be done for us. That is what we want and that is
13 what we require, and we hope that for this time there
14 will be a change from what we have seen over the past
15 decade, decade, and decade. Thank you.

16 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you for your
17 testimony.

18 The next witness is Brad Baber.

19 BRAD BABER: Thank you. Brad Baber,
20 B-a-b-e-r. I am a citizen of Joliet.

21 There have been rumors that some are
22 attempting to draw districts that are like long
23 fingers coming out of the city of Chicago which would
24 reach far out into the suburbs. Like many of the

1 other presenters have stated, that makes no sense and
2 does not represent our committees appropriately.

3 Currently, as the map is drawn we already
4 have some of these long fingers connected by thin
5 slivers.

6 Now, in an attempt to do so clearly would be
7 an attempt to gain a political advantage. It is
8 disgustingly self-serving for either party to do such
9 a thing and not represent the people of this state
10 appropriately.

11 Joliet, Bolingbrook, Shorewood, Plainfield,
12 all of these Will County towns that surround Joliet
13 are nothing like Chicago and are not a suburb of
14 Chicago. We have always been separate, and we should
15 not be broken up in any way or connected with any of
16 the Chicago suburbs or Chicago itself.

17 So, thank you very much, and I hope you will
18 seriously consider this and not continue partisan
19 politics that has continued in the state for as long
20 as I have been alive. Thank you.

21 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you for your
22 comments.

23 Our next witness is Evonne Bolton from
24 Joliet.

1 EVONNE BOLTON: My name is Evonne Bolton,
2 and I am just speaking as a citizens of Joliet. I
3 would like to thank you for letting me speak. I would
4 like to thank you, Representative Kosel, for your
5 comments that you started out. I would urge all of
6 the representatives here to take into consideration
7 her comments.

8 In a true democratic society I would urge
9 you to consider the citizens foremost and take them at
10 their thoughts, that if you really truly want to serve
11 as an elected official, when you consider the fact
12 that what Tom Thanas -- your comment that you said, I
13 think that that was very timely.

14 Also, the gentleman from Orland Park, I
15 don't want to keep going over all the thoughts. I
16 think that those were very good comments. I think
17 that it should be put to -- you should have sincerest
18 consideration before putting this out. It should be
19 something that you should give some serious
20 consideration because the citizens of all the
21 surrounding counties should have a vote before this
22 gets set into stone.

23 That is pretty much all I would like to say.
24 Thank you.

1 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you. We
2 appreciate your testimony.

3 The next witness is Charlie Convery,
4 Alderman from Crest Hill.

5 CHARLIE CONVERY: Charlie Convery,
6 C-o-n-v-e-r-y, Alderman, City of Crest Hill. I thank
7 you for holding the hearing, and I firmly believe you
8 there will be transparency, which is what all of us
9 want.

10 We are part of the Joliet area. We are a
11 small part of it. There was approximately 75,000
12 people, you know, brand new to the Joliet area. I am
13 one of them. I've only lived here about eight years
14 now, but I am very happy with it. We are a small
15 town. We are a small part of it. We have grown from
16 about 10,000 to about 18,000 people over ten years.
17 It is not a lot, but for a small town it is a lot.

18 I will echo what Mr. Thanas said about
19 keeping us together. We want to be as compact as
20 possible. We are not a big town, so we should not be
21 split up. We are happy right now with our
22 representation. Senator Wilhelmi is one of them right
23 there, and Jack McGuire is part of it, and Emily
24 McAsey is another part of it too. We are very happy

1 with them. Let's keep this small town together.

2 Let's not break us up. Let's keep us as compact as
3 possible. I thank you very much.

4 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you, sir. We
5 appreciate your comments.

6 James Roolf.

7 JAMES ROOLF: It is very nice to be here
8 today, and thank you for the opportunity to speak to
9 you about the whole redistricting of our state as a
10 result of the last census.

11 I think it's important to pay attention to
12 some of the comments that have been said today, in
13 that really what we need to do is have a commonsense
14 approach to this redistricting. I worked for a
15 banking organization that has offices all over the
16 state and when I try to figure out who represents what
17 district here or there, it's almost incredible to do
18 that task without having electronic capabilities
19 because they are connected with such small fingerling
20 type connectors.

21 If you use our 11th Congressional District
22 as an example, we go from the eastern part of Will
23 County all the way to Bureau County and then straight
24 south to Bloomington.

1 What we should use is a commonsense
2 approach. We should use boundaries of cities,
3 townships and counties and try to capture the diverse
4 populations of all of those areas by doing that.

5 The City of Chicago and Cook County is an
6 incredibly large part of this state, and if you were
7 to look at the district maps there, as I have, some of
8 them just blow my mind as to how creative somebody had
9 to be to come up with that particular district map. I
10 marvel at people that build bridges and skyscrapers,
11 but some of the things that are done to create these
12 districts make those look like Tinker Toys. I mean
13 it's incredible to me as we look at this how these
14 districts become.

15 I know a lot of you are democrats and
16 republicans. That's irrelevant to me in this process.
17 I think it is critically important that we focus on
18 what is best for our state and the people who live and
19 pay the taxes here because we're the employer here,
20 not the employee, and I think we need to make sure
21 that we look at this process in that fashion. And
22 people will vote how they vote. That is entirely up
23 to them, but I think a commonsense approach to the
24 redistricting of the state of Illinois is really not

1 an option. It is an imperative. Thank you.

2 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you, sir.

3 Next witness is Alicia Morales.

4 ALICIA MORALES: Good afternoon. Thank you
5 everybody for representing today. My name is Alicia
6 Morales, M-o-r-a-l-e-s. I am a lifelong resident of
7 Joliet and a taxpayer and just want to reiterate
8 everything that has been said here today, on behalf of
9 the Latino Committee, and I am personally making a
10 mission for myself not to inform but educate people to
11 understand what redistricting is, how important it is
12 and to get out and vote most importantly.

13 But just like everybody has been saying
14 here, I completely agree we need transparency. It's
15 no longer an option. We need transparency. The
16 Latino voters are becoming more and more savvy and
17 educated and we will participate in upcoming
18 elections, but we don't want to see any maps drawn
19 with any political advantages. That is not
20 acceptable.

21 I think the people are very smart taxpayers.
22 We want transparency. That is all. Thank you very
23 much.

24 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you for your

1 testimony.

2 That completes the witness list in my
3 possession. Is there anyone else in the audience who
4 wishes to testify to the committee? Anyone? Going,
5 going.

6 We want to thank you, all of the witnesses,
7 for being here today. We would certainly like to
8 thank the staff and the City of Joliet for its
9 hospitality and thank the members for being here.

10 I want to thank you all for your
11 participation. We look forward to receiving
12 additional comments and suggestions through the public
13 access stations and over the internet.

14 With that, the hearing will now stand --
15 before I finish, Representative Kosel.

16 REPRESENTATIVE KOSEL: I have just one
17 question for the Chairman: Is it the intention of the
18 chair to have the maps be made public before the
19 committee votes on them and/or the house votes on
20 them?

21 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Well, it certainly
22 isn't my decision, Representative, but let me say
23 this: As you know, creating maps is a very
24 time-consuming and lengthy process. We've included

1 the general public in this process well beyond the
2 statutory requirement. We've dealt with this openly
3 and transparently. And truthfully, as you know, the
4 final hearing of this committee is Monday in
5 Springfield. Beyond that, there is no timetable set,
6 other than is the statutory and constitutional
7 timetable.

8 So there will be decisions made moving
9 forward about what the further processings of the
10 Redistricting Committee will be. I have to tell you
11 very honestly, they have not been determined yet.
12 They have a lot to do, and there will be public
13 announcements as to when our timetable will be moving
14 forward.

15 REPRESENTATIVE KOSEL: Thank you very much.
16 I hope that it will take into consideration the many
17 people that testified and said they would really like
18 to see a map before it is voted on, and I would like
19 to echo those comments. Thank you.

20 REPRESENTATIVE LANG: Thank you,
21 Representative. With that, the hearing will now stand
22 in recess. Thank you for your attendance.
